CATZ CHARITY FOUNDATION

The Catz Charity Foundation (CCF) was founded in direct response to the devastating tsunami which struck South-east Asia on 26 December 2004. This tsunami is believed to be one of the deadliest in history, killing over 230.000 people, destroying entire towns, villages and which tore communities apart across 14 countries.

Everyone at Catz felt the desire to help because Catz International has held business relationships in most of the affected countries for decades. As a consequence of this natural disaster direct support was provided to projects in India and Sri Lanka through our local partners. Since then Catz International

has devoted a percentage of its annual profit to initiate and support worthwhile projects in countries from which we derive our products.

The CCF aims to help vulnerable people in their most basic living conditions, such as shelter, food, sanitation, healthcare, and education. Projects should intend to improve the living conditions of the local population by the construction of new water and sanitation systems, schools, or healthcare facilities and conform to six donation criteria. Several Catz employees devote a part of their spare time to CCF administration and the selection of new projects voluntarily.





DONATION CRITERIA



Donation criteria of the CCF include, but are not limited to, the following elements:

- Projects need to be carried out in the countries from which we derive our products, for example, India, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Africa and Vietnam.
- Projects need to be charity related with no connections to business.
- Projects need to consist of investments in physical goods and related to service to realize these goods.
- Projects are preferably small-scale so that they can be financed 100% by CCF and allow for more control on execution.
- Projects need to have minimal overhead. The donation needs to be used completely for the project.
- We only work together with reliable partners for long-term projects and prefer to start with small projects, with the opportunity to grow over time.

INSEPARABLY CONNECTED



Years ago, the collaboration between the Blessed Generation and the CCF arose from the question: "How could we really help your education system?" It may sound a bit crazy from a country where food, water and electricity are not guaranteed, but the answer was: "computers". After all, if students want to leave school with an opportunity on the labor market, knowledge of how to use a computer and the internet has become essential. The CCF did not listen with half an ear and not only donated computers but also financed the construction and furnishing of an entire computer room. A wonderful piece of progress that the people at Blessed Generation with pride call the computer laboratory.

This collaboration soon developed into a friendship characterized by a lot of e-mail contact between the CCF and Blessed Generation Kenya. The involvement of Catz took on beautiful forms such as a goat-herding sponsoring event where a director of Catz organized a running competition. The proceeds of this event supported a boy from Blessed Generation who wanted to start a goat-herding business. Catz also helped with the purchase of a tractor to work the land

and the construction of a borehole that supplies all residents of Blessed Generation and residents in the vicinity with water.

What are the biggest problems for an organization like Blessed Generation - an organization that provides education and strengthens shelter and families in the area? The biggest challenge is gathering the daily expenses - taking care of basic needs such as food. The CCF saw this need and responded by committing to a large annual donation for these basic needs, which gives so much peace of mind and confidence – and gives room to further think about providing good care.

Now in 2020; let's say the year of corona - a year in which families in Kenya also have a hard time because day laborers have lost their income - housekeepers have been sent home - masons and woodworkers are all out of work. Blessed Generation was not allowed to keep its 700 children under one roof and many children now live in host families - or with

uncles and aunts - it is tough. But thanks to the help of the CCF, Blessed Generation can help all those families where they are now. Blessed Generation helped children as well as other affected families with food and soap - people can get water from the water pump and the land can be lowed for 2021 in which hopefully the doors of the schools that are now closed will be able to open again.

For now, it is a great privilege that Blessed Generation has learned to use computers in recent years - that Blessed Generation has learned about digitization. The teachers create assignments for the students - print them out and get them to the children to keep the children busy. Meetings from home via Zoom ensure that all assistance continues. that we know which families are doing well and which children are sick, need extra help or need to go back to the care of Blessed Generation. Digitalization was never as important as in the year 2020 that brings us back to the beginning of the collaboration with the CCF - the computer laboratory where the digitization process of Blessed Generation began. Results of computer education can also be seen on the Facebook page of Blessed Generation Children's Centre-Kenya where students regularly post videos of people who have been helped or are being helped by Blessed Generation.

An agriculture project started by the organization **Silent Work**. The Catz Charity Foundation financed a tractor and its shipment to Mauritania.





In partnership with the foundations, Mirjam in Malawi and The Art of Charity the CCF funded the Food for Life project, in which farmers are trained to grow maize in a way that gives a much larger yield than the traditional way.



The Leprazending foundation, which provides care to leprosy patients in the medical, social and mental fields. With the help of the CCF, 12 young people receive access to education so that they will have the knowledge and skills to provide for themselves in the future.
